Bando de la Huerta:

Kicking off the spring festival season with exuberance and flair is the Bando de la Huerta. The origin of this festival dates back to 1851, and from my understanding, a day to honour the "huertano". It was declared a Festival of International Tourist Interest in 2012 and is a celebration of countryside traditions, which are deeply connected to the history of this city. This beloved event, typically held on the Tuesday following Easter Sunday, transforms the streets of Murcia into a bustling spectacle of music, dance, and gastronomy. Locals and visitors alike don traditional huertano attire, characterized by colorful dresses and chalecos/waistcoats, as they parade through the city, showcasing Murcia's agricultural heritage. The aroma of freshly prepared local delicacies fills the air, tempting taste buds with specialties like zarangollo (a traditional vegetable dish) and pastel de carne (meat pie). Live music and dancing add to the festive atmosphere, making it a joyous celebration for all. It's literally one big party in the streets of the city and not something to miss out on if you're in the area.

Highlights of Bando: Paparajotes, the huertano parade, parties in the street, the huertano outfits

Entierro de la Sardina:

The Burial of the Sardine festival is also one of the main events of the Murcia Spring Festival. It consists of a parade with a giant papier-mâché sardine, representing the end of the festival and the beginning of spring. The sardine is accompanied by floats and it's basically a fantastic show with music and entertainment. During the parade, thousands of toys are handed out from the floats to children. At the end of the evening it is set alight like a bonfire and crowds of people at the town square wait to see this momentous occasion, followed by fireworks and party vibes.

Highlights of Entierro: The toy parade, the burning of the sardine, the fireworks

These are only two of the main activities during the Spring Festival Week in Murcia, but there is so much more on offer. You can also enjoy workshops, exhibitions, theatre shows

and other fun activities. It is a long-awaited celebration for the people of Murcia, and an unforgettable experience for those who visit for the first time.
